James "Jay" Hundley, III is a third generation farmer from Champlain, Virginia. His operation, Cloverfield Enterprises, raises corn, soybeans, wheat and barley on about 7,500 acres in Essex, Caroline and King George counties.

David Mayonado has served as a Technology Devel-

opment Representative for Monsanto for the past 25 years. His presentation will focus on dicamba tolerant soybean stewardship. The EPA and the dicamba manufacturers have developed new product labels and training requirements to promote proper use of this new technology.
